In order to nurture the passions of the students, college is adopting multidisciplinary approach which helps students to crave their own path. College implemented outcome based education which promotes the applied aspects of multidisciplinary education. Existing syllabus allows commerce students to choose allied subjects like economics or mathematics .science students to choose Math or Physics Also students were allowed to choose nonmajor electives from other disciplines. Furthering the efforts to enhance the skills and capabilities of Students, College is planning to bring in short term and vocational courses.

The curriculum that offered currently includes credit-based courses. Additionally, the college encourages students to enrol in courses provided online by SWAYAM, NPTEL, etc. Student-centered learning, which incorporates project-based learning, internships, assignments, and problem-based learning, is implemented in the classroom to guarantee the quality of course delivery to ensure student's preference

17.Skill development:

In addition to academic credentials, Alpha Arts and Science College aims to impart skills that would prepare students for the workforce. College offers certificate programmes in communication skills, including BEC from Cambridge University. The college has signed MOUs with TIE, ICT and YUVA and hosts various programmes on campus to foster students' entrepreneurial skills. Students participate in internship programmes to hone their skills in the fields they are interested in. Students are given opportunities to represent student forum which is an elected position to explore their leadership skill.

Nearly every industry is experiencing change as a result of technology. Recognizing the value of technical skills, departments now offer certificate programmes relevant to their industry. Mou with Skillrack helps the students to enhance coding skills. Students have the chance to serve as president and vice president of different cells and department clubs, where they plan numerous activities to foster the development of their social, decision-making, and problem-solving skills.

Literature, Culture, arts and social practices falls under the ambit of IKS. Orienting students in our rich tradition instil pride in being Indian. To uphold Tamilian Culture, the college hosts traditional games during the Pongal festival on campus. Our students extended their learning by teaching Silambam to the adopted school's students. Additionally, students have the option of choosing Hindi as a language course. Even though the recommended language of instruction is English, we give due emphasize to Tamil, Malayalam, Telugu, Sanskrit and Hindi so that our students' understanding and application is not compromised over Indian languages. In our college, promoting Indian culture and Indian languages across the curriculum is given a higher priority.

Alpha arts and science College offers 11 programs and all these programs are offered as outcome based Education by clearly stating the Program outcomes and Course outcomes. Program outcomes not only focuses on developing domain -specific skills but also on outcomes that ensure ethical progress and entrepreneurial skill .College instructs the course instructors to decide the outcome of the course focusing on cognitive abilities like Remembering, Understanding, Applying, Analysing, Evaluating and Creating. 2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organizes special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

For first year Students College conducts bridge course for English, Mathematics and technical aspects in their respective domain. At the end of the bridge course an assessment is made to determine the learning level of the students. Depending on their performance tutorial class is organised for advanced learners and remedial class for slow learners. The second and third year student's levels are identified based on their marks in previous examinations.

The faculty encourage advanced learners to take part in various seminars, conferences, and intercollegiate competitions. They are also adviced to take more tests, do more revisions, work through difficult problems, etc., as an effort to improve their university standing. For slow learners extra classes are handled to clarify their doubts, the mentor card which documents the academic progress of the student is reviewed periodically by the mentor and counselling is provided, wherever necessary to help the slow learner. PTA meetings, Academic Review meetings help monitor the progress of the learners.

2.5 - Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 - Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode. Write description within 200 words.

College ensures that internal exams are conducted in a transparent manner. The date of the CIA and Model exams is determined by the college council at the beginning of the Year and is published in academic calendar which is made available in website. Assignment, seminar, attendance and internal tests are all included in the internal assessment process. The course instructor gives students advance notice of these internal components. At the completion of every unit course instructor gives an assignment, seminar to test the cognitive abilities of the students. Before internal and model exams, the Principal and Vice-Principal Academics check if the syllabus has been completed. Exam cell conducts common internal test at the completion two and half units and Model examination after the completion of five units. Exam cell sends a circular to departments to submit the question paper pertaining to exams within a stipulated time. Course instructor prepares the question paper which is verified by Head of the department and Principal. Exam cell prepares the time table for the examination in turn departments circulate it to the students.

Course instructor records the marks in log book. Along with seminar and assignment, attendance, average marks of CIA and Model exam is taken to arrive the internal marks for 25 marks. Internal marks is disclosed to students before the end semester examination and the same is acknowledge by students Any grievances relating to internal assessment is represented by student to exam cell through grievance redress form which is presented before Examination committee and resolved with the help of the Principal within a time frame of 10 days

For first year Students College conducts bridge course for English, Mathematics and technical aspects in their respective domain. At the end of the bridge course an assessment is made to determine the learning level of the students. Depending on their performance tutorial class is organised for advanced learners and remedial class for slow learners. The second and third year student's levels are identified based on their marks in previous examinations.

The faculty encourage advanced learners to take part in various seminars, conferences, and intercollegiate competitions. They are also adviced to take more tests, do more revisions, work through difficult problems, etc., as an effort to improve their university standing. For slow learners extra classes are handled to clarify their doubts, the mentor card which documents the academic progress of the student is reviewed periodically by the mentor and counselling is provided, wherever necessary to help the slow learner. College ensures that internal exams are conducted in a transparent manner. The date of the CIA and Model exams is determined by the college council at the beginning of the Year and is published in academic calendar which is made available in website. Assignment, seminar, attendance and internal tests are all included in the internal assessment process. The course instructor gives students advance notice of these internal components. At the completion of every unit course instructor gives an assignment, seminar to test the cognitive abilities of the students. Before internal and model exams, the Principal and Vice-Principal Academics check if the syllabus has been completed. Exam cell conducts common internal test at the completion two and half units and Model examination after the completion of five units. Exam cell sends a circular to departments to submit the question paper pertaining to exams within a stipulated time. Course instructor prepares the question paper which is verified by Head of the department and Principal. Exam cell prepares the time table for the examination in turn departments circulate it to the students.
